Bible text explored: Genesis 39:1–23

¹Now Joseph had been brought down to Egypt, and Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh, the captain of the guard, an Egyptian, had bought him from the Ishmaelites who had brought him down there. ²The LORD was with Joseph, and he became a successful man, and he was in the house of his Egyptian master. ³His master saw that the LORD was with him and that the LORD caused all that he did to succeed in his hands. ⁴So Joseph found favor in his sight and attended him, and he made him overseer of his house and put him in charge of all that he had. ⁵From the time that he made him overseer in his house and over all that he had, the LORD blessed the Egyptian's house for Joseph's sake; the blessing of the LORD was on all that he had, in house and field. ⁶So he left all that he had in Joseph's charge, and because of him he had no concern about anything but the food he ate.

Now Joseph was handsome in form and appearance. ⁷And after a time his master's wife cast her eyes on Joseph and said, "Lie with me." ⁸But he refused and said to his master's wife, "Behold, because of me my master has no concern about anything in the house, and he has put everything that he has in my charge. ⁹He is not greater in this house than I am, nor has he kept back anything from me except you, because you are his wife. How then can I do this great wickedness and sin against God?" ¹⁰And as she spoke to Joseph day after day, he would not listen to her, to lie beside her or to be with her.

¹¹But one day, when he went into the house to do his work and none of the men of the house was there in the house, ¹²she caught him by his garment, saying, "Lie with me." But he left his garment in her hand and fled and got out of the house. ¹³And as soon as she saw that he had left his garment in her hand and had fled out of the house, ¹⁴she called to the men of her household and said to them, "See, he has brought among us a Hebrew to laugh at us. He came in to me to lie with me, and I cried out with a loud voice. ¹⁵And as soon as he heard that I lifted up my voice and cried out, he left his garment beside me and fled and got out of the house." ¹⁶Then she laid up his garment by her until his master came home, ¹⁷and she told him the same story, saying, "The Hebrew servant, whom you have brought among us, came in to me to laugh at me. ¹⁸But as soon as I lifted up my voice and cried, he left his garment beside me and fled out of the house."

¹⁹As soon as his master heard the words that his wife spoke to him, "This is the way your servant treated me," his anger was kindled. ²⁰And Joseph's master took him and put him into the prison, the place where the king's prisoners were confined, and he was there in prison. ²¹But the LORD was with Joseph and showed him steadfast love and gave him favor in the sight of the keeper of the prison. ²²And the keeper of the prison put Joseph in charge of all the prisoners who were in the prison. Whatever was done there, he was the one who did it. ²³The keeper of the prison paid no attention to anything that was in Joseph's charge, because the LORD was with him. And whatever he did, the LORD made it succeed. [ESV]

Review and application:

1. Pastor Moody first placed this passage in its broader "Book of Beginnings" context. How did God's creation begin with blessing? (See *Gen. 5:1-2.*)

How did the curse of Adam and Eve's sin extend to their descendants? (See *Gen. 6:5-8.*)

After the flood and the linguistic garbling at Babel, whose family line did God select to bless? (See *Gen. 12:1-3.*)

On what descendants of Abraham is God's blessing now focused? (See *Gen. 37:2a and 50:20.*)

2. With Joseph first sold into slavery by his brothers, and later unjustly imprisoned, his misfortunes might appear unrelated to God's control. But what phrase (*vv. 2 and 21a*) shows that God's steadfast love remained focused on him?

When have you been tempted to doubt that God was *with* you? What (*vv. 3 and 23*) explains Joseph's success and promotions?

3. Pastor Josh noted that "blessing" is not something we receive, but a quality that resides within us. How (vv.4 and 21b) did Potiphar and the keeper of the prison view Joseph?

How (v. 6) was Joseph's blessing passed on to his Egyptian masters?

4. How have the sexual temptations that Joseph faced (vv. 7 and 10-11) proliferated in our day?

How does that make our low-profile Compass an essential ministry component?

5. Confronted with similar temptations, Samson succumbed (*Judg. 16:4-5 and 16*). What reasons (*vv. 8-9*) did Joseph spell out to Potiphar's wife for rejecting her advances?

What enabled Joseph to take an emphatic stand? (See *Psa. 119: 9 and 11; Job 31:1.*)

How has memorizing Scripture helped you withstand temptation?

Does the way you relate to God make fear of failing him the strongest safeguard of your purity? (See *Psa. 51:4.*)

6. How, in this narrative, were God's dream promises to Joseph beginning to be fulfilled?

How might the Lord use you to bless those around you?
