The Argument of Moses' Prayer

YHWH has invested great effort in saving the Israelites from the bondage of Egypt; by implication, to destroy them would mean this was effort was wasted (v. 13).

YHWH has been uniquely close to his people: he is in their midst and has been personally leading them; by implication, it makes no sense to destroy them (v. 14).

YHWH's reputation among the nations will be damaged if he destroys Israel; they will think that he slaughtered them in the desert because he was unable to carry through on his promise to give them the land (vv. 15-16).

YHWH's gracious character is in question; he has proved himself merciful in the past—may he be gracious again and forgive his people (vv. 17–19).
