Theme Statement	Every firstborn that is born among your herd and among your flock, the male you must dedicate to YHWH.	Before YHWH your God you may eat year by year at the place that YHWH chooses— you and your household.
Commentary	You may not work with the firstborn of your oxen.	But if it has any defect—lameness or blindness— any serious defect you may not sacrifice it to YHWH your God.
	And you may not shear the firstborn of your flock.	In your gates you may eat it, the clean and the unclean together, like the gazelle or like the deer. Only its blood you may not eat . On the ground you must pour it like water.
