2. Theological and Spiritual Lessons from Deuteronomy 29

- a. Covenant relationship with YHWH is to be understood as an incredible privilege.
- b. Divine intervention in the human constitution is required to make people responsive to the grace that he offers.
- c. Individuals who trample underfoot the grace of God may not seek cover under the national umbrella as they pursue their rebellious ways.
- d. Infidelity to YHWH and his covenant has tragic missiological consequences.
- e. Sometimes outsiders are more sensitive to divine truth than those who claim to be the people of God.
