Bible text explored: Genesis 32:1–32

¹Jacob went on his way, and the angels of God met him. ²And when Jacob saw them he said, "This is God's camp!" So he called the name of that place Mahanaim. [a]

<sup>3</sup>And Jacob sent messengers before him to Esau his brother in the land of Seir, the country of Edom, <sup>4</sup>instructing them, "Thus you shall say to my lord Esau: Thus says your servant Jacob, 'I have sojourned with Laban and stayed until now. <sup>5</sup>I have oxen, donkeys, flocks, male servants, and female servants. I have sent to tell my lord, in order that I may find favor in your sight.'"

<sup>6</sup>And the messengers returned to Jacob, saying, "We came to your brother Esau, and he is coming to meet you, and there are four hundred men with him." <sup>7</sup>Then Jacob was greatly afraid and distressed. He divided the people who were with him, and the flocks and herds and camels, into two camps, <sup>8</sup>thinking, "If Esau comes to the one camp and attacks it, then the camp that is left will escape."

<sup>9</sup>And Jacob said, "O God of my father Abraham and God of my father Isaac, O LORD who said to me, 'Return to your country and to your kindred, that I may do you good,' <sup>10</sup>I am not worthy of the least of all the deeds of steadfast love and all the faithfulness that you have shown to your servant, for with only my staff I crossed this Jordan, and now I have become two camps. <sup>11</sup>Please deliver me from the hand of my brother, from the hand of Esau, for I fear him, that he may come and attack me, the mothers with the children. <sup>12</sup>But you said, 'I will surely do you good, and make your offspring as the sand of the sea, which cannot be numbered for multitude.'"

<sup>13</sup>So he stayed there that night, and from what he had with him he took a present for his brother Esau, <sup>14</sup>two hundred female goats and twenty male goats, two hundred ewes and twenty rams, <sup>15</sup>thirty milking camels and their calves, forty cows and ten bulls, twenty female donkeys and ten male donkeys. <sup>16</sup>These he handed over to his servants, every drove by itself, and said to his servants, "Pass on ahead of me and put a space between drove and drove." <sup>17</sup>He instructed the first, "When Esau my brother meets you and asks you, 'To whom do you belong? Where are you going? And whose are these ahead of you?' <sup>18</sup>then you shall say, 'They belong to your servant Jacob. They are a present sent to my lord Esau. And moreover, he is behind us.'" <sup>19</sup>He likewise instructed the second and the third and all who followed the droves, "You shall say the same thing to Esau when you find him, <sup>20</sup> and you shall say, 'Moreover, your servant Jacob is behind us.'" For he thought, "I may appease him with the present that goes ahead of me, and afterward I shall see his face. Perhaps he will accept me." <sup>21</sup>So the present passed on ahead of him, and he himself stayed that night in the camp.

<sup>22</sup>The same night he arose and took his two wives, his two female servants, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. <sup>23</sup>He took them and sent them across the stream, and everything else that he had. <sup>24</sup>And Jacob was left alone. And a man wrestled with him until the breaking of the day. <sup>25</sup>When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he touched his hip socket, and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. <sup>26</sup>Then he said, "Let me go, for the day has broken." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." <sup>27</sup>And he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." <sup>28</sup>Then he said, "Your name shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, <sup>[b]</sup> for you have striven with God and with men, and have prevailed." <sup>29</sup>Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. <sup>30</sup>So Jacob called the name of the place Peniel, <sup>[c]</sup> saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life has been delivered." <sup>31</sup>The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip. <sup>32</sup>Therefore to this day the people of Israel do not eat the sinew of the thigh that is on the hip socket, because he touched the socket of Jacob's hip on the sinew of the thigh. ## Review and application:

- 1. As Jacob reached the border of his homeland (vv. 1-2) after 40 years away, how did God signal to him that this—more than a physical return—was his opportunity to claim God's promised protection and blessing? (See *Gen. 28:13-15.*)
- 2. How had Jacob just managed to arrive at a stand-off in his fractured relationship with his uncle Laban? (See *Gen. 31:51-52.*)

But what longer-standing fractured relationship (vv. 3-7a) loomed ahead for Jacob? (See also *Gen.* 27:41.)

3. Initially (*vv.* 7*b*-8), what was Jacob's usual self-reliant strategy for averting this threat? But on what (*vv.* 9 and 12) does he then base his prayer?

What (v. 10) replaces self-reliance?

What (v. 11) does he admit, and for what does he plead?

- 4. Do you think the stage-managed presentation to the advancing Esau of some 500 animals (*vv. 13-21*) was reverting to self-reliance or making a genuine attempt at reconciliation?
- 5. What did Jacob's withdrawal from his large family (vv. 22-24a) reveal about his sense of what was at the heart of his problem?
- 6. Pastor Moody identified the unnamed man (vv. 24b-25) as the pre-incarnate Son of God. Why do you think he allowed Jacob to successfully resist him during this prolonged wrestling match?

What did wrenching Jacob's hip out of place reveal about who retained ultimate control?

7. What did Jacob's hanging in there to receive God's blessing (vv. 26-29) reveal about his newfound resolve?

Was the Man's question really about Jacob's name or actually about the character that it indicated?

Did the new name he gave Jacob show that God had already begun reshaping his life?

8. Review the blessings we sang about in stanza 3 of "Great Is Thy Faithfulness":

Pardon for sin

Peace that endures

God's presence to cheer and guide

Strength for today

Bright hope for tomorrow

What other blessings should we be striving to obtain . . .

- ... For our families?
- ... For our fellowship?
