## Bible text explored: Mark 4:35-41

<sup>35</sup>On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, "Let us go across to the other side." <sup>36</sup>And leaving the crowd, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. And other boats were with him. <sup>37</sup>And a great windstorm arose, and the waves were breaking into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. <sup>38</sup>But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion. And they woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" <sup>39</sup>And he awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. <sup>40</sup>He said to them, "Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?" <sup>41</sup>And they were filled with great fear and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?" [ESV]

## **Review and application**:

1. Have you or anyone you know ever wondered whether there is a God? What would it take for you to say of Jesus, "Who then is this?

In this passage we have a storm, Jesus, and a response.

- This (vv. 37-38) was more than an ordinary storm. How many of the disciples were experienced fishermen?
  What was their assessment of the danger?
- 3. What scary storms are we facing nationally in our "age of outrage"?

What personal storms are threatening you?

 Once awakened, how (vv. 39-40) did <u>Jesus</u> speak to the storm? (The word here rendered "peace!" carries the sense of "be muzzled!")

What was the result?

What did nature's response to Jesus establish?

- 5. When facing a crisis, do we instinctively appeal for God to bring his power to bear?
- 6. Why (*v*. 41) do you think the disciples' <u>response</u> was one of great fear?

What was it that prompted them to exclaim, "Who then is this?"?
