Bible text explored: Luke 19:28-44

²⁸And when he had said these things, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. ²⁹When he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany, at the mount that is called Olivet, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰saying, "Go into the village in front of you, where on entering you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever yet sat. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' you shall say this: 'The Lord has need of it." ³²So those who were sent went away and found it just as he had told them. ³³And as they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying the colt?" ³⁴And they said, "The Lord has need of it." ³⁵And they brought it to Jesus, and throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶And as he rode along, they spread their cloaks on the road. ³⁷As he was drawing near—already on the way down the Mount of Olives—the whole multitude of his disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen, ³⁸saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" ³⁹And some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." ⁴⁰He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the very stones would cry out."

⁴¹And when he drew near and saw the city, he wept over it, ⁴²saying, "Would that you, even you, had known on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. ⁴³For the days will come upon you, when your enemies will set up a barricade around you and surround you and hem you in on every side ⁴⁴and tear you down to the ground, you and your children within you. And they will not leave one stone upon another in you, because you did not know the time of your visitation." [ESV]

Review and application:

1. What discovery did Pastor Josh says could make this Palm Sunday unforgettable? How does this mesh with Gospel writer Luke's aim in narrating the story of Jesus' triumphal entry? (See *Luke 1:4.*)

The name of the city Jesus and his disciples were entering is significant: Jeru =foundation or possession; Salem =peace.

- 2. What does the English word *peace* convey? What broader meanings does the Hebrew word *shalom* carry?
- 3. What psalm phrases (v. 37) were Jesus' disciples shouting as they entered the city? (See *Psa. 118:22-27.*)

What failure of comprehension by the city's rulers and residents (v. 42) drove Jesus to tears?

We can find peace (vv. 29-38) through what we praise. Jesus was deliberately fulfilling the messianic prediction of Zech. 9:9-10.

4. How did the actions of the two unnamed disciples' praise God?

How did a "multitude" of Jesus' disciples praise him with biblically based cheers?

How could we, as onlookers did for an intimidated fireman on a ladder, "cheer up" someone to find real peace?

We can find peace through what or whom (vv. 39-40) we listen to.

- 5. Do we listen to those who suppress guilt by a show of their own morality? How did Jesus equate the self-justifying objections of the Pharisees with the Babylonians, against whom Habakkuk prophesied? (See *Hab. 2:9-11.*)
- 6. How is listening to God's Word every day like priming a pump to restore a flow of living water?

We can find peace when we decide (vv. 41-44).

Pastor Josh quoted Teddy Roosevelt: "In any moment of decision, the best thing you can do is the right thing . . . the worst thing you can do is nothing."

- 7. What was Jesus' emotional response to those who had resisted their opportunity to accept salvation?
 - What outcome (fulfilled in A.D. 70) did he foresee for those who opposed his rule?
- 8. Pastor Josh warned that it is possible to say no to God's gift of peace so often that he will finally decide to take us at our word. What outcome will that involve? (See *Matt.* 25:31-33, 46.)
