Series: I Wish I'd Asked That; Sermon: "How Do You Find Complete Joy?" Delivered on May 5, 2019, by Dr. Josh Moody, senior pastor

Bible text explored: John 16:17-28

¹⁷So some of his disciples said to one another, "What is this that he says to us, 'A little while, and you will not see me, and again a little while, and you will see me'; and, 'because I am going to the Father'?" ¹⁸So they were saying, "What does he mean by 'a little while'? We do not know what he is talking about." ¹⁹Jesus knew that they wanted to ask him, so he said to them, "Is this what you are asking yourselves, what I meant by saying, 'A little while and you will not see me, and again a little while and you will see me'? ²⁰Truly, truly, I say to you, you will weep and lament, but the world will rejoice. You will be sorrowful, but your sorrow will turn into joy. ²¹When a woman is giving birth, she has sorrow because her hour has come, but when she has delivered the baby, she no longer remembers the anguish, for joy that a human being has been born into the world. ²²So also you have sorrow now, but I will see you again, and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you. ²³In that day you will ask nothing of me. Truly, truly, I say to you, whatever you ask of the Father in my name, he will give it to you. ²⁴Until now you have asked nothing in my name. Ask, and you will receive, that your joy may be full.

²⁵"I have said these things to you in figures of speech. The hour is coming when I will no longer speak to you in figures of speech but will tell you plainly about the Father. ²⁶In that day you will ask in my name, and I do not say to you that I will ask the Father on your behalf; ²⁷for the Father himself loves you, because you have loved me and have believed that I came from God. ²⁸I came from the Father and have come into the world, and now I am leaving the world and going to the Father."

Review and application:

- 1. Our Declaration of Independence declares as our unalienable rights: "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." What are indications that this pursuit is not going well in our culture?
- 2. What deeper quest did Jesus address (vv. 17-19) behind the confusion his disciples were feeling?
 - What is the difference between happiness—reliant on happenings—and joy—sustained in spite of adversity? (See *James 1:2-4* and *12*.)
- 3. To what (vv. 20-22) did Jesus compare the anguish of his coming death and the subsequent elation and wonder of his resurrection?
 - Pastor Josh compared the unquenchable joy that believers experience to reading a conflict-filled book, like Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings*, another time. What makes a second reading different?
- 4. For Jesus' disciples, how (vv. 23-28) would praying be transformed once he had returned to the Father?
- 5. Praying to the heavenly Father in Jesus' name implies what about . . .
 - ... the basis on which we may approach God directly?
 - ... our understanding of the things that Jesus "could sign off on"?
 - ... what kind of responses we are entitled to expect?
- 6. How should confidence about receiving what we've asked for make our joy complete?
