Bible text explored: 2 Timothy 2:20–26

²⁰Now in a great house there are not only vessels of gold and silver but also of wood and clay, some for honorable use, some for dishonorable. ²¹Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from what is dishonorable, he will be a vessel for honorable use, set apart as holy, useful to the master of the house, ready for every good work.

²²So flee youthful passions and pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace, along with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart.

²³Have nothing to do with foolish, ignorant controversies; you know that they breed quarrels. ²⁴ And the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, ²⁵correcting his opponents with gentleness. God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth, ²⁶and they may come to their senses and escape from the snare of the devil, after being captured by him to do his will. [ESV]

Review and application:

In today's passage Paul uses two images to help Timothy discern what to focus on in order to be used by God to make a difference.

- 1. The first image (*vv.* 20-22) is of containers in a well-furnished home: some suitable for serving fine meals, others for taking out the garbage. How did the false teaching of Hymenaeus and Philetus (2 *Tim* 2:17-18) make them unsuitable for serving guests? What are some false teachings of our day which, if embraced by us, would disqualify us from being "honorable vessels"?
- 2. What did Timothy need to pursue to assure that the Master could use him to bless others?
 - From what did he need to flee?
- 3. The second image Paul used (*vv.* 23-26) is of a servant. Why should he not allow himself to get side-tracked by arguments over non-essentials?
 - What qualities does a servant need in order to deal with difficult people who oppose him?
- 4. What adjustments might you need to make in order to endure evil patiently and to treat your opponents with kindness?
 - What is the positive outcome that Paul sees God as able to achieve in response to persistent, gentle truth-teaching?
