Bible text explored: John 17:4–5

⁴I glorified you on earth, having accomplished the work that you gave me to do. ⁵And now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had with you before the world existed. [ESV]

Review and application:

- 1. In sports, the word *glory* has been used to describe a height of achievement. But what did this word describe about an invisible God in the Old Testament Scriptures? (See Exod. 16:10; 24:17 and Lev. 9:23.) How does the emphasis shift to God made flesh in New Testament Scriptures?
 - (See John 1:14; 2:11; 12:23-24, Romans 16:27 and Heb. 1:2-3)
- 2. Why (v. 4) do you think Jesus, on the eve of his crucifixion, spoke of his work as "accomplished"? (See John 13:31-32.)
- 3. Why is reliance on the finished work of the cross a certain reality? (See Heb. 7:27; 9:28 and 10:10 and 12.)
- 4. How is the honor/shame paradigm exchanged for the sin/forgiveness paradigm for each of Jesus' disciples? (See Jesus words later in the same prayer: *John 17:22*.)
- 5. How (v. 5) did Jesus' sacrificial death on the cross, plus his resurrection, secure his exalted vindication?
 - Why may we joyfully savor being included in this victory?
- 6. What was the pre-incarnate glory to which Jesus was about to be restored?
 - Why does thinking of Jesus primarily as your friend reveal a small-God understanding?
 - How does recognizing that he is Lord of the universe add a big-God element of awe?
 - How should comprehending the divine passion demonstrated in the cross drive us beyond awe to worship?
