One of the church's elders, Elder Chang Shun, was one of the 18 people arrested during the raid. This is the third time Elder Chang Shun has been arrested in the last six months.

## Pastor Dead in Vietnam After Forced Denunciation of Faith

Pastor Y Bum Bya was found dead under mysterious circumstances on March 8. Publicly declared a suicide by local authorities, the pastor's death is under scrutiny from Christians around the world. While the Vietnamese government promotes the façade of religious freedom, instances such as the abuse and denunciation forced upon Pastor Y Bum Bya demonstrate the true reality.

# Global Prayer Guide YEMEN

#### RESTRICTED

#### **OVERVIEW:**

For many years, the people of Yemen have suffered from civil wars and violence from Islamic extremists, including al-Qaida. Although the situation has further deteriorated since the start of the most recent civil war, the gospel has flourished and many Yemeni Muslims have come to know Christ. Yemeni Christians have become bolder in their outreach efforts, though it is still extremely dangerous to even be identified as a Christian. They must reach out in creative ways that are both bold and wise. Small but steady numbers of Yemenis are continually being added to the body of Christ, and more are gaining interest as the influence of Christian media grows. Most regions of the country include at least one follower of Christ.

#### **MAJOR RELIGION:**

Nearly all Yemenis are Muslim, about onethird Shiite and two-thirds Sunnis, both of which are represented by warring factions that divide the country. Christians in Yemen account for only a small fraction of 1 percent of the population.

#### PERSECUTOR:

Persecutors include the government, Islamic extremist groups, communities, tribes and families of Christian converts.

# WHAT IT MEANS TO FOLLOW CHRIST IN YEMEN:

Converting to Christianity from Islam is a crime punishable by death, and families consider it extremely shameful for a family member to become a Christian. Christian converts face harassment, the possibility of losing jobs and family relationships, and potentially death. Christians worship secretly in homes or in small groups outdoors.

#### **ACCESS TO BIBLES:**

Bibles can be found in Yemen, but they are difficult to obtain and dangerous for converts to own. For these reasons, many Yemeni believers access the Bible online.

#### **VOM WORK:**

VOM helps Christians who are persecuted for their faith and supports Yemeni believers who reach out in their community. We also support various forms of media that make God's Word more accessible inside Yemen and help Yemeni believers who had to flee and now live in nearby countries.

#### PRAYER REQUESTS:

- Pray for local fellowships meeting in secret throughout the country.
- Pray for Ahmed and his family as they seek asylum in a foreign country because of persecution.
- Pray that imprisoned believers will continue to find strength and encouragement in Christ.
- Pray for displaced believers who are leaving the country as refugees.
- Pray that the faith of persecuted Christians who leave the country will not be shaken.
- Pray for the boldness, wisdom and protection of underground churches.
- Pray for Sarah, who was recently released from prison.
- Pray that a persecuted woman and her children will continue to find peace in Christ.

While doing so, the pastor read Deuteronomy 16:18-20, which says that judges should judge the people fairly without taking bribes or showing partiality. The judge responded by saying, "Pastor, you have given me the greatest gift, and this Bible teaches me."

# Pastor, Son Brutally Beaten for Christian Worship

While 80 Christians gathered on Feb. 19, 2023, to worship, a mob of Hindu extremists broke into the church and demanded proof

that they had permission to be there. When the mob began to attack Pastor Zahir, his son, Ashok, defended him and also became a target. The two men were kicked, punched and beaten with a microphone stand until they were both bleeding and unconscious. Other members of the congregation were also injured as the mob ransacked the church while shouting Hindu slogans. When the police arrived, they took Zahir into custody and questioned him but refused to accept his criminal complaint against the attackers. Both Zahir and Ashok have recovered physically, though Ashok continues to experience pain.

 Pray for the wellbeing of this family and church amid persecution. "Please pray for the vandals," Ashok said. "Pray that they bend their knees in front of Jesus."

#### **April**

#### MONDAY 1

African Christians were mobilised for urgent prayer after at least 15 believers in Mauritania were arrested in late November 2023, a country which has a death sentence for leaving Islam. A video of a baptism ceremony had become public. Praise God that by 18 December all the Mauritanian

Christians (converts from Islam) had been released without charge. Praying Christians in other countries rejoiced at this answer to their intercessions and some asked for prayer to continue that the Mauritanian laws and structures which "criminalise being a Christian" will be repealed. Join them in praying for the day to come when Mauritanians can openly worship the Lord Jesus and talk publicly about their faith without fear of punishment.

#### **TUESDAY 2**

Please pray today for Christians in Morocco, who are mostly converts from Islam and their children or grandchildren. The Muslim fasting month of Ramadan is in progress, during which it is illegal for Moroccan citizens or inhabitants to eat or drink in public during the daytime. A typical Ramadan day begins with drummers or the town crier blowing a horn to wake families for the pre-dawn meal. A cannon is fired to mark the beginning of the day's fast and an air raid siren in the evening marks its end. People go to the mosque more often than normal during Ramadan. In this situation, Moroccan Christians must be even more discreet than usual.

• Pray especially for those who follow Christ in secret without their families knowing, at this time when Muslims are expected to be extra devout in their religious observances.

#### **WEDNESDAY 3**

An Algerian church leader, Pastor Youssef Ourahmane, has partially won an appeal against a two-year prison sentence, which has now been reduced to one year. He had been charged with holding an unauthorised religious meeting in a building not permitted to be used for religious worship. The allegation arose because of some Christian families staying in a church compound with a chapel that had been sealed by the Algerian authorities. (At the latest count, 49 church buildings in Algeria have been forced to close by the March/April 2024 10 authorities, leaving only about seven open.) Youssef is appealing to a higher court hoping for an even

more favourable decision so that he will not have to go to prison at all.

 Pray for him, for Algerian Christians who are currently in prison, and for all the Lord's people in Algeria, that the difficulties they face will continue to draw them closer to each other and to God.

#### **THURSDAY 4**

At the time of writing, armed conflict in the Holy Land continues. As you pray about the situation, remember all who are suffering so terribly there, including the Christians of Gaza, who number fewer than a thousand. By midDecember, 20 of them had been killed and most of the rest were sheltering in two church buildings in the Old City area of Gaza. At that time, they still had some food stocks but needed medicines.

 Pray that they will know the Lord's presence with them and hear His words in their hearts: "Do not be afraid, little flock" (Luke 12:32).

# Belarus: Faith in the Face of the Oppressor

Belarus is the birthplace of Mission Eurasia's founders, the Deyneka family. A former Soviet state, Belarus has remained largely dictatorial. Its only president—Aleksandr Lukashenko—is a Soviet holdover who continues consolidating his power. His 2020 re-election was disputed, but protests were violently suppressed. Belarus has been instrumental in Russia's invasion of Ukraine, allowing the use of Belarusian territory for transit.

Economically, Belarus struggles to establish an identity and footing due to state control, corruption, and dependence on Russia. In tandem with government-imposed price controls on food and medicine, public debt and inflation are projected to explode with the end of Russian energy subsidies in 2024.

Orphaned children number in the tens of thousands with roughly 25,000 orphaned due to the 2008 economic crisis alone. Many were separated from their parents by the state. Orphanages cannot provide necessary care—even less so for children with disabilities. Some disabilities still stem from lingering effects of the Chernobyl disaster.

Religiously, Belarus is 60–70 percent Christian (primarily Belarusian Orthodox), with the remainder of the population being mostly non-religious. Only one to two percent are evangelical Christian. A 2002 religious law intensified government regulation of religious groups and activity. Required registration remains difficult to obtain and still does not offer protection from property and tax disputes or raids that result in evictions and closures. Harassment disproportionately affects non-Orthodox groups. All activity by unregistered groups and foreign missionaries is banned and met with fines and imprisonment for non-compliance.

By God's grace, through the Deyneka family, Mission Eurasia was grandfathered in as a recognized religious entity due to official registration before the 2002 law took effect. Amid the strict religious landscape, our SWW program remains one of the most strategic and effective means of preserving and growing the church. In 2023, you supported our SWW ministry training for 93 future leaders enrolled in the program.

# As Easter Approaches, Christian Persecution Is on the Rise | Opinion

For Catholics the world over, as in other Christian traditions, Lent is a time to reflect on the strength of our faith, repent our transgressions, and prepare ourselves for Easter and the salvation promised by Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.

For most Christians in the United States and the developed world, Lent tests the sincerity of our devotion with the temporal temptations of modern life. But in much of the global south, one's faith can be subject to far more severe trials. Millions of Catholics risk their lives to worship God, and the simple act of attending Mass can be life threatening.

According to a 2023 report published by Aid to the Church in Need (ACN), a Catholic charity dedicated to sustaining the faith in places where it is oppressed, the persecution of Christians is on the rise globally. "Almost 340 million Christians around the world—or 1 out of every 8," the report declares, "live in a country where they suffer some form of persecution, such as arbitrary arrest, violence, a full range of human rights violations and even murder."

Nowhere is that disturbing reality more in evidence than in Nigeria, a country where the population is approximately half Christian and half Muslim, and where violent attacks on Christians have escalated since 2009, when Boko Haram began its brutal campaign of kidnapping and killing Christians.

If the current situation remains unchanged, before Holy Week ends this Easter, we will in all likelihood receive new reports of Catholics murdered in Nigeria, as was the case last Christmas when as many as 200 Catholics were slaughtered and hundreds more injured in attacks in more than 20 Nigerian villages.

Twenty Catholic missionaries were murdered in 2023, according to Fides, the news agency of the Pontifical Mission Societies. Of the nine missionaries killed in African countries, Nigeria had the highest total—four more souls added to the thousands of Nigerian Catholics killed last year for practicing their faith. Churches and seminaries are regularly attacked by criminal gangs and Islamic jihadists. Nearly every week last year, a Catholic priest was kidnapped, and many remain missing. In 2022, the ACN had already established that anti-Christian violence "In Nigeria and other countries...clearly passes the threshold of genocide."

What can be done to confront the spread of religious persecution in Nigeria and elsewhere? We can start by raising awareness of the crisis, by acknowledging its existence and confronting its perpetrators. America was founded on the conviction that all people are entitled to religious freedom. It's one of our founding principles, and the government of the United States has a moral and now, more recently, a legal responsibility to support that value wherever it is assailed.

The International Religious Freedom Act, signed into law in 1998, directs the State Department to designate countries where religious persecution is flourishing as "countries of particular concern," and to impose certain sanctions accordingly. Last year, the department neglected to designate Nigeria as "a country of particular concern" despite having identified it as such over the previous four years, and despite the fact that persecution there has worsened, not improved.

The U.S. government should correct that oversight this year. We cannot rally the free world to the cause of the persecuted if the leader of the free world makes exceptions for countries where people are suffering persecution, but where we might have competing interests.

"How many of you pray for Christians who are persecuted," Pope Francis asked Christians everywhere at the beginning of his pontificate. "Do I pray for that brother and sister who's in difficulty for confessing their faith?" The Pontifical Mission Societies, which His Holiness heads, and which I have the privilege of serving as national director, exist to translate prayer into action. Pope Francis' focus, and thus ours, has always been on the Church's missions.

We are charged to share and spread the faith by providing material and spiritual support wherever the need is great with an emphasis on those too young, poor, or actively persecuted to be self-sustaining, and in any place where God "has been denied, forgotten, persecuted or shunned."

As I noted above, religious persecution is on the rise worldwide, even in the U.S. Yet the Church is growing in vitality where it faces its greatest threats. Lent, this season of reconciliation and renewal, summons believers to the aid of the oppressed, so they may persevere in growing the Church no matter how dire the difficulties arrayed against them.

All free people should expect their governments to act as apostles of freedom and stand with those who ask nothing more and nothing less than to worship God and to live their faith in their daily lives freely and without fear.
